NEW Minor Procedure Room

At Woodstock Hospital, we continually look for innovative ways to enhance our programs and services to meet the needs of our community. One recent change is the relocation of cataract surgeries from the Operating Room (OR) to a newly redesigned minor procedure room. This new space is located in the Pre-Admit Clinic on the main floor of the hospital.

"When the Ministry of Health recommended hospitals reintroduce surgeries and procedures that were paused due to COVID-19, we recognized a competing need for OR time to make our way through the backlog," explained Janice Koekebakker, Director of Surgical Services. "Because pre-operative nursing and anesthesia consult appointments were now occurring virtually rather than in-person, we had an unused treatment area in the Pre-Admit Clinic."

With improved technology, cataract surgery has come a long way over the years and is now considered a minor procedure. At Woodstock Hospital, cataract patients receive an eye gel that dilates and freezes the eye. The procedure is done while the patient is awake and remains in their street clothes. It takes a total of 10-15 minutes to complete the procedure.

Although cataract surgery is considered minor surgery, the procedure room had to meet the same CSA standards as an operating room. Construction took place in November and December 2020, with the first cataract

surgery performed in the new space on January 5, 2021.

By moving cataracts out of the OR, the hospital has freed up time in the OR for other surgeries that require general anesthesia, such as tonsils, hernias, and orthopedic cases. But according to Janice, that's not the only benefit.

"With both of our ophthalmologists utilizing operating time in the new procedure room, we have been able to increase the number of cataract procedures performed, which will reduce wait times," added Janice.

Looking ahead, the hospital plans to move other minor procedures, such as carpal tunnels, to the new space.

PARTNERING with Community Organizations

Woodstock Hospital was pleased to partner with the OPP and Woodstock Police to have Constable Lisa Narancsik host a webex for hospital staff to learn how to identify potential cases of human trafficking in the Emergency Department.

"Because of where you are situated along the highway, Woodstock Hospital is at the centre of what is happening," stated Constable Narancsik. "People can travel down the highway towards the United States or in the opposite direction towards Toronto where there is a major airport."

Constable Narancsik confirmed there have been cases of human trafficking in Oxford County. Human trafficking involves the recruitment, harbouring and control of the movement of persons for the purpose of exploitation. Constable Narancsik said one thing that hospital staff can do to help victims is have information and resources available that they can hand to the individual should they suspect something is wrong.

"It's important that we all work together to provide the victim with the proper resources and supports they may need to help get them out of the situation," added Constable Narancsik.

SPOTLIGHT

on Respiratory Therapy

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought the important role of Respiratory Therapists (RT) to the forefront. If patients develop severe respiratory complications and need the assistance of a ventilator, it is the RTs job to operate these machines and continually manage and assess the patient's respiratory status.

While you may not have heard as much about this profession before the pandemic, RTs have always been an integral part of the healthcare team. Caring for ventilated patients is just one aspect of their profession.

"RTs evaluate a number of different lung and breathing disorders and recommend and carry out treatments," explained Chuan Yong, Manager of Respiratory Therapy. "They also respond to cardiac arrest codes, including neonatal resuscitations."

Woodstock Hospital's Cardio-Respiratory Department is comprised of 14 Registered Respiratory Therapists and one Cardio-Vascular Technologist.

"Over the past year, our department has grown and we have been able to increase the hours and appointments for outpatient services such as Pulmonary Function Tests and Holter Monitoring," added Chuan. "This means that Oxford County residents will have more timely access to cardiopulmonary tests."

Chuan has also been focusing on more training and education for staff within the department, so that the RTs

are working to their full scope of practice and ensuring the services provided are current and based on best available scientific evidence. The goal of the department is to ensure residents of Oxford County receive respiratory care when they need it, and as close to home as possible.

"By building our staff's confidence with additional training and education, we are empowering staff to expand their expertise, which in turn leads to more job satisfaction and employee retention," said Chuan.

Woodstock Hospital has over 1,000 staff in a variety of different roles. Each staff member is essential to the WH family and helps ensure we are providing exceptional care and services for patients in Oxford County. We thank Chuan and his team for sharing insight into the exciting role of Respiratory Therapy. ■

Back to the services of the porters, who were always so upbeat, to take me to Occupational Therapy. The ladies there were so helpful and encouraging. I would also like to recognize Carol Pace and the entire Outpatient Physiotherapy team, who have supported and guided me throughout the recovery process.

There was not a weak link in the skills or care I received from admittance to discharge. It was the attitude that was consistent in every service and support I received. So I want to congratulate everyone for their thoughtfulness and care. Well done. I have always been proud of our hospital and that pride has only been reinforced. ■

SPRING Brings COVID-19 Vaccine to SWPH Region

Ever since the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic in March of 2020, we have waited and wished for a vaccine. Thanks to an incredible commitment by governments and industry, the first two vaccines, one developed by Pfizer-BioNTech and the other by Moderna, were approved

by Health Canada in late 2020.

Vaccines currently approved in Canada help your body to recognize the COVID-19 protein and form an immune response using something called messenger RNA or mRNA. Studies show both are very effective at preventing the virus. Because the vaccine is new, we do not yet know how long the protection lasts. The most common side effects are very common with immunizations – tenderness and mild swelling at the injection site, tiredness, and body aches.

At Southwestern Public Health, we are committed to working within Ontario's Three Phase vaccine strategy to get vaccines out quickly to eligible groups starting with those who have been deemed high priority. Longterm care and select retirement home residents and staff were first priority to receive vaccinations in January and February. In mid February, essential caregivers, health

care professionals (at risk due to their exposure at work), remaining retirement home residents, urban Indigenous adults, and older adults living in the community in congregate settings were able to schedule appointments.

We are preparing to launch the biggest mass vaccination effort in our region's history. This work is only possible with the collaboration of many partners – hospitals, emergency services, municipalities, community agencies and primary care providers, among others. We are excited and honoured to play this important role in our community.

OXFORD and Area Ontario Health Team Update

The Ministry of Health approved the Oxford and Area Ontario Health Team's (OHT) full application and in November 2020, it was officially designated as an OHT. OHTs are groups of healthcare providers and organizations that are working together to deliver a full and coordinated continuum of care. This means, patients should experience easier transitions when they go from one healthcare provider or setting, to another.

With this approval, the Oxford and Area OHT will begin focusing on year one initiatives. This includes improving care navigation for three priority populations first, before expanding the care model to all patients within the region. The priority populations are people with multiple chronic conditions, people with palliative care needs and people experiencing challenges relating to mental health and addictions.

The goal is to provide patients with 24/7 care navigation, a single number to call with any questions or concerns, and access to their health information so that they can play a more informed role in their care. Because healthcare providers are working together as a team, the patient's story, chart and care plan will follow them throughout their healthcare journey.

In January 2021, the partner organizations of the Oxford and Area OHT put together an agreement called the Collaborative Decision Making Agreement, which details how they commit to working together.

With COVID-19, there have been great examples of collaboration among partners. Most recently, members of the Oxford and Area OHT worked together to effectively respond to outbreaks at long-term care and retirement homes in the region. As the current health crisis demands the attention of many of the partner organizations, some of the timelines for year one initiatives may change.

PREPARING

for the Arrival of Your Baby

Due to COVID-19, the obstetrical pre-registration process has changed for expectant parents delivering at Woodstock Hospital.

You will receive your pre-registration package from your obstetrician or midwife and complete the required documents at home, rather than attending an in-person pre-registration appointment. In this package, you will also receive information about your upcoming stay in the hospital, postpartum mood disorder information and a guide to your baby's immunizations.

In addition, Woodstock Hospital has created a preregistration video that is available on the hospital website at www.wgh.on.ca under the "Our Services" tab and "Maternal Child Services" that will help prepare you for your upcoming visit.

Between 35-36 weeks gestation, you can drop off your completed pre-registration package at the hospital. Please come into the main entrance off Juliana Drive and give your pre-registration package to the Pandemic Response Workers at the Information Desk. They will place your package in the drop-off box that is then collected by the department. Please feel free to call the Maternal Child/Women's Health Department at 519-421-4210 if you have any concerns about the pre-registration process, or if you feel you should come in to be assessed.

ACCREDITATION

The accreditation process is one of the best ways that Woodstock Hospital can demonstrate to our community that we are meeting or exceeding quality standards for patient safety, every day in every way.

During accreditation, peer surveyors evaluate the hospital's programs and services and discuss our processes surrounding patient safety, governance, leadership and communication. We then receive an accreditation decision, based on compliance with standards

Our Laboratory Services Department and Pharmacy Department underwent separate, mandatory assessments while the hospital completed a successful voluntary accreditation. We are excited to share highlights of accreditation with our community.

LABORATORY

On October 27, 28 and 29, 2020, the Laboratory Services Department underwent a mandatory accreditation assessment. Because of COVID-19, a group of four assessors met with the lab virtually. The lab was evaluated against standards covering quality management systems, physical facilities, pre and post analytical systems, quality assurance, safety and point of care. The Laboratory Department achieved a 97% compliance rate from Accreditation Canada – Diagnostics.

"The assessors were impressed with our inventory management processes, and the overall organization of the lab," shared David Rupert, Director of Technical Services. "We had a lot of new staff participate in this evaluation and they did exceptionally well in demonstrating our commitment to quality in the lab."

The Laboratory Services Department achieved a Four Year Certificate of Accreditation, which is the highest award possible.

PHARMACY

The Pharmacy Department underwent a virtual accreditation assessment on January 28, 2021. The department was assessed on 122 standards with a focus on medication safety, especially pharmaceutical compounding. Compounding refers to preparing custom medications to fit the unique needs of a patient, which cannot be met with commercially available products.

"One of the strengths identified in our evaluation was that we have proactive processes in place to review medication safety events to improve our practices," said Fatima Vieira-Cabral, Director of Pharmacy and Chemotherapy

Our Pharmacy Department successfully completed the assessment and was awarded a Certificate of Accreditation by the Ontario College of Pharmacists.

ACHIEVEMENTS

WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL

Once again, Woodstock Hospital has achieved Accreditation with Exemplary Standing by Accreditation Canada – the highest award issued through the hospital accreditation program.

On December 7, 8 and 9, 2020, Woodstock Hospital underwent an accreditation survey, whereby peer surveyors evaluate the hospital's programs, policies and procedures. Due to COVID-19, Accreditation Canada adjusted the assessment so that it was a combination of on-site and virtual meetings with hospital staff.

"Obtaining Accreditation with Exemplary Standing in the midst of preparing for and responding to a global pandemic, demonstrates the hospital's unwavering commitment to high quality, patient-centred care and services," stated Perry Lang, Woodstock Hospital President & CEO. "Preparing for accreditation is a multi-year process. We are very proud of this achievement and thank our staff for all of their hard work and dedication in preparing for this accreditation survey."

Woodstock Hospital was evaluated on 1,828 standards, and of those standards, the hospital was in compliance with 97.3%. In addition, WH was in compliance with all of the Required Organizational Practices.

By achieving Accreditation with Exemplary Standing,

Woodstock Hospital will not undergo another accreditation survey for four years.

Accreditors acknowledged the hospital's COVID-19 response and development of strategies to communicate and treat patients virtually. They also noted patient flow as an area of strength, with accreditors acknowledging the Emergency Department's exceptional wait-time performance. They also described staff and physicians as highly dedicated and skilled in the delivery of patient care and services. It was evident to the accreditors that staff are proud of the work they do.

As an example, some of the proceeds from the Foundation's 50/50 raffle will support equipment that needs to be replaced in the Diagnostic Imaging (DI) Department. This includes a general radiology camera and mobile fluoroscopy camera.

The new general radiology camera will replace a camera purchased at our old hospital site in 2005, while the new mobile fluoroscopy camera will replace a camera purchased in 2006. The mobile fluoroscopy camera helps physicians, predominantly in the Operating Room, visualize live-time urology and orthopedic exams.

"Both of our new cameras will become the workhorses of our department," said Brad Gates, Manager of Diagnostic Imaging at Woodstock Hospital. "The basic function of the cameras has not changed but the new bells and whistles are always exciting to see. It's similar to comparing the differences between a vehicle from 2005/2006 and one that is built today."

In 2019/2020, the DI Department at Woodstock Hospital completed 69,388 Diagnostic Imaging Exams. Your support of the Foundation's fundraising initiatives ensures that departments, like DI, have the specialized equipment they need to carry out exceptional care and services for the community.



CELEBRATING 25 YEARS!


