

Woodstock Hospital Recognized Provincially for Most Improved Ambulance Offloading Practices

Working with its partners at Oxford County Paramedic Services, Woodstock Hospital has significantly reduced its Ambulance Offload Times (AOT), an important step towards improving the patient experience for area residents.

Ambulance Offload Times are measured from the time the ambulance arrives at the ambulance garage to the time when the paramedics give a face-to-face report to the Emergency Department nurse and the patient is physically moved off the ambulance stretcher onto a hospital stretcher or wheelchair.

Recently, Woodstock Hospital's Emergency Department was recognized as a 'Most Improved Ambulance Offload Performer' by the Provincial Emergency Department Clinical Lead, Dr. Howard Ovens, and has been asked to share best practices and strategies with emergency departments across the province.

In 2017, nine out of ten ambulances were offloaded in 21 minutes or less at Woodstock Hospital, compared to 49 minutes across the South West Local Health Integration Network (LHIN). Across other LHIN's in Ontario, this figure ranged from 10 minutes to 97 minutes.

Additional contributors to this success include fostering a culture of quality improvement, supporting patient flow throughout the hospital, utilizing the physical layout of the Emergency Department and creating and using real-time data collection tools.
